I have two questions about Christmas. First, why do we use red and green during the season? Second, what does the word Noël mean?

The Church uses colors as symbols to mark the change of liturgical seasons and to remind ourselves of religious themes. White (or gold) is actually the liturgical color for the Christmas season, and violet (purple) for the weeks of Advent.

Red and green were associated with a wintertime feast that predates Christianity. However, since these colors have additional meanings for Christians that relate to this time of year, they are still in use and commonly associated with the holiday (holy) season. December 28 is the feast of the Holy Innocents, the male children of Bethlehem who were slaughtered by Herod's order. Its color is red, the color of martyrs. Poinsettia flowers and candy canes, popular Christmastime accents, also prominently feature red. Green—most visibly found in evergreen trees and wreaths—is the color of life. During Advent, it witnesses to the imminent birth of Jesus, which brings hope for new and eternal life to the world.

In response to your second question, Noël is an old French word meaning "Christmas," "the Christmas season," or "yuletide." The French word comes from the Latin for "birth" or "birthday." As we all know, Christmas is the time when we celebrate the birth of Jesus and the Incarnation of our Lord and Savior.

Words from the Pastor

+JMJ+

I want to offer a word about Christmas mass times..... it seems like a lot of masses, but please consider that two things are going on this year; we are adapting to a 1) call for an earlier night-time offering **and** trying out a true midnight, and also 2) this year Christmas Day falls on Sunday. I wanted to honor our regular Sunday schedule, much like we do on Easter Sunday having regular 7:00 am and 10:00 am mass. I am very sensitive to people's family traditions and schedules because Church is part of all of our lives. Any adjustment in one is an adjustment in the other. So to have an earlier eve mass, but still dark enough to have the full effect of all the candles and lights amid the darkness (Candlelight Mass), **we will be having an 8:00 pm mass in place of last year's 11:00 pm**, but also offer a **12:00 pm midnight** too! But we still have the 4:00 pm Children's Mass, followed up with Christmas morning at 7:00 am and 10:00 am. We can certainly review this schedule afterward to see how it works or doesn't, to accommodate family traditions. Of course, next year won't fall on Sunday, so that will be one difference. But I want to hear what people think about the schedule and how introducing an extra mass helps or not. We will be advertising the other area parishes' Christmas schedules to help everyone find a time most fitting to their family and company visiting and traditions. We will see-Let me know!

What is the Advent 'watch-word'? It is "Repent"! The word 'repent' means both 'Look' and 'Turn', as in 'look around' and 'turn back to God'. To me, John the Baptist is the 'poster-child' of Advent! He is always pointing toward Jesus, saying 'Get ready, Jesus is coming!' Matthew 3:2 has John speaking his basic message, "**Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!**" As an introduction, he identifies himself in the line of OT prophets & quotes Isaiah 40:3 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths'. Advent calls us to 'make preparations, clear the way and straighten up, because God is visiting.' What can we do to best prepare for God's coming again into our world? Well, what do we do to prepare for any visitor? Open the door, turn on a light, clear the table, bring from the cabinet some food/ drinks, tidy-up and welcome the Guest! So, how much more should we do if that visitor is God?

What a great government conspiracy movie plot! Scoot over Oliver Stone and Michael Moore! Here comes Matthew! Matthew tells of political drama and palace intrigue in the Herod Dynasty. The conspiracy plots against John the Baptist are remarkable (and with Jesus later as the great betrayal by Judas & Temple Priests get into Jesus' inner circle!) In today's gospel we hear about some of the forces conspiring to eliminate John. For John the Baptist, only Jesus-God and God's kingdom matter. He wants everyone to repent and turn back to God. He does want the Pharisees and Sadducees to convert. But, John is not stupid or naive about the level of corruption within the power structure of Palestine-Rome. For example some people have said that John is not giving the Pharisees a chance to convert when he says "You brood of vipers, who warned you to escape the coming wrath." No, John is simply putting his own followers on alert and letting the Pharisees and others know he is aware of the devious and cunning plans of some of his adversaries. Someone has to let them know they need to change. So the question to answer is: **Are they coming to John to truly change their lives**

and convert to godly living? **Or are they coming out to spy** and find grounds to trump up charges later to have him tried and killed? I think John knows that King Herod is behind the Pharisees **conveniently** showing up, appearing at his spiritual revival meetings at the Jordan River! King Herod is the one who is going to have John killed (you can find all of the details in Matthew 14:3-5, about Roman politics & John's traditional teaching on marriage). Jesus is fully aware of this political, palace drama when he begins ministry later. Jesus even calls Herod 'that fox' after He is warned by some good Pharisees that Herod was plotting to kill Him too! (Find it in Luke 13:32). While the Pharisees have different motives (spiritual jealousy & envious pride) to want John eliminated, they still join forces with other threatened power groups. Storm clouds gather in a perfect storm when all these evil forces team up against Jesus as we hear about in Mark 3:6 "The Pharisees went out and immediately **took counsel with the Herodians against Jesus** to put him to death." Also in Mark 12:13 we hear about this axis of evil against Jesus when Mark writes that "They (**chief priests & scribes**) **sent some Pharisees and Herodians to Jesus to ensnare him in his speech**" Now maybe this is way more information than we wanted to know about, but my point is simply that John the Baptist knew that many forces did not want people to convert and change their lives to more faithful living according to gospel of Jesus. They so opposed Jesus and His Kingdom to the point of working against Him and ultimately killing Him. Like the line in the movie "Cool Hand Luke, "What we got here is a failure to..... --- (commune with God), so you get what you saw happened to John!" John tried! John wanted them to convert, but he was also wise to their deception and cover. So John invites them to give a practical sign of their authenticity, to show their seriousness about conversion to God's ways. In Matthew 3:8, John says, ""Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance." Advent is a time of preparing and working up signs of **our own genuine conversion** and readiness for God's coming!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: What did God tell me today at Mass? Is it a message to share with someone else?

Monday: If I had to give an accounting to God of my life today, what would I be saying?

Tuesday: Am I alert to the needs of those around me? Am I aware of my own heart's feelings, anxieties or needs? Do I need to spend more time in prayer about either or both?

Wednesday: Noah lived by his own faithful ness to God's call against everyone else's opinions. Am I that strong in faith to stand against the tide of others people's opinions?

Thursday: How much unfinished business do I carry from day to day? What do I need to focus most on to feel more prepared for Jesus' second coming?

Friday: Perform some act of mercy or anonymous act of kindness for someone today.

Saturday: Consider coming to mass early and pray the rosary with others and pray over the readings from the missalette before Mass.

Civil rights are sacred

On this day in 1955, the day of Rosa Parks' trial, the historic bus boycott began in Montgomery, Alabama in protest of her arrest. That day, some 40,000 African-American commuters chose to walk to work, no matter the distance. Despite many efforts (some violent) to put an end to the boycott, it lasted for a year. In June 1956, a district court declared that racial segregation laws were unconstitutional and in November of that year the Supreme Court upheld that ruling. We often forget that our notion of civil rights comes from our Christian heritage. Let's pray for rights for all, especially those who are most marginalized by our society.

MEMORIAL OF NICHOLAS, BISHOP

Nicholas was a beloved fourth-century bishop who has been appropriated as a patron saint of sailors, fishermen, merchants, broadcasters, the falsely accused, repentant thieves, brewers, pharmacists, archers, pawnbrokers, and students! But for most of us, he is associated by legend with Christmas and immortalized in Clement Moore's poem, "A Visit from Saint Nicholas." His feast is like a little Christmas, a reminder that the feast you are about to celebrate in 18 days has little to do with material gift-giving and everything to do with generous love-giving. Stories about Nicholas involve anonymous generosity to someone in need. Be generous today in honor of old Saint Nick!

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 7

MEMORIAL OF AMBROSE, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

Be a spirited voice for unity

We live in polarized times. How can we find our way past our divisions? Perhaps Ambrose, a holy man from the fourth century, can suggest a way forward. Back in the day, arguments over the divinity of Christ spilled into disputes over church leadership. Ambrose, who at the time wasn't even a baptized Christian, appealed to all factions and was spontaneously called forth as bishop by popular acclaim. The Spirit moves in surprising ways. Be a force for unity wherever

you find division: in your church, your community, your family.

Look with favor upon the pain of those who are suffering in body or in spirit, on those afflicted by poverty, loneliness, marginalization, or ignorance. May all people, civic leaders and ordinary citizens alike, always act in accordance with the demands of justice and with respect for the dignity of each person, so that in this way peace may be reinforced."
