Are we required to disobey or break an evil law?

According to St. Thomas Aquinas, a just law has four characteristics. It must be (1) an ordinance of reason, (2) for the common good, (3) properly promulgated, (4) by a legitimate authority. If one of these elements is lacking, then the law is an unjust law and need not be followed.

According to St. Augustine, evil is a lack of something that should be there. When applied to law, if one of the four characteristics is missing, the law lacks something that should be there and is evil. An unjust law, in other words, is an evil law.

As Christians, we are generally encouraged to obey the laws of the state. As the Apostle Paul states, "Let every person be subordinate to the higher authorities, for there is no authority except from God" (Romans 13:1). At the same time, we also have the responsibility of forming our consciences according to God's revelation in Scripture and Tradition as interpreted by the divinely ordained teaching authority of the Church. Although we are not bound to follow an unjust law, the degree to which we should actively disobey it depends on the level of evil the law promotes. Because of its serious nature, a law promoting abortion, for example, should be actively resisted through peaceful protests and appropriate legal and civil activism.

Laws that promote lesser evils need to be carefully evaluated by Church authorities and our own well-informed consciences.

"Do not let your hearts be troubled"(John 14:1) Assuring words such as these are often found on the lips of Jesus. A few years ago an article ran around the internet claiming that 'Fear Not' or similar phrases appears **365** times in the Bible (as if God was giving specifically His Word of **comfort to us for every day of the year!**) However it turns out that there are only about 80 actual references in the Bible calling us to 'fear not' or 'not be afraid' and

about 30 more examples that suggest the same thing using other words like 'Peace be with you' (John 20:19) or ;Cast your worries on Christ!' (1 Peter 5:7). So, while we may not have a different reference for each day of the year, I still believe that **if we read our bible every day** (even if for only ten minutes) God will work wonders, by taking away our anxiety and worry! I like the quick sayings or quotes (easy to repeat reminders), but instead of such little peeps or boosts some people may be helped more by recalling a parable story or miracle account of Jesus (like 'Jesus did it once, and He could do it again!') And depending on how tangled our lives become in worry/stress, we may feel like it takes divine intervention to take away our obsessive concerns. Yet, still, a good dose of daily reading and prayer is the best prescription for curing/coping with anxiety!

I am aware that some people react negatively to clichés like 'Don't worry, be happy!' Do you? We might want to say 'Easy for you, I am the one facing the IRS audit, or have to find a way to repair the car again to get another 40,000 miles out of it'. Aware of this time of year, many people may be saying, 'How am I going to complete the papers and exams before graduation, or how am I going to get to three graduation ceremonies in the same day?' If so, I bet you were tempted to say to the friendly neighbor who encouraged you to 'be happy', *'You stress me out more saying that, as I judge myself worse for not being able to handle it all!'* Maybe the more Christian response to our anxious neighbors/friends is to not say 'Don't worry' but instead to ask "How can I help you lessen that worry-what can I do to ease up some of the weight?" St Paul says, "Bear one another's burdens, and so you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). Or St James had said in his letter (2:15-16) "If a brother or sister has nothing to wear and has no food for the day, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, keep warm, and eat well," **but you do not give them** the necessities of the body, **what good is it?"** We do need words and we need to talk with one another, but quickly we come to the point in relationships when action is needed. Words need to become flesh. I'm told by therapists that any actions, even the smallest steps can alleviate pressure, so going ahead and doing something physical as preparation to meet the stress, is better than stewing, paralyzed in the tension! **Maybe that first act can be to step aside** and dedicate time to pray/meditate about God's direction for you. **I think this is where Jesus takes his talk about 'Let not your heart be troubled'.** Action faithfully follows His Word. Jesus goes on to say, "In my Father's house there are many dwelling places." More than a just offering a comforting word about accepting death (going home to the Father) at the end of our lives, Jesus is offering for this moment right now, the assurance that with Him, there are

always options, always 'other ways' to make it through our trials. Jesus knows many 'rooms', many routes, multiple paths, other options, to make it to the Father's House. Don't we feel most frustrated when the **'one and only way'** is blocked to us? Well, Jesus is the Way, and with Him, we will make it! 'Many rooms in the Father's house' is like saying 'there are many options to arrive at the same end'. But He has to lead, so we have first to go to Him. "Where there is a will, there is a way" means God's Will, and it finds, becoming the Way! The Father's Plan has all contingencies accounted for, if we insert ourselves faithfully into His service! Jesus tells us, "Stay by me, and I will find you the way." Things may not look or feel anything like what we think they should, but Jesus will find us that way to/through one of those 'MANY' dwelling places in the Father's House/Plan! Loving Jesus, and loving His presence finds the Way for us!

"I will show you a more excellent WAY", St Paul says, before ending his thoughts, with these words, **"Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails"**(1 Corinthians 12:31, 13:7). Great hearts feel alike, as St John knows **"Perfect love casts out all fear"** (1 John 4:18). Love takes away fear because Love is its own cause and end. Love is not attached to one result, other than sharing Itself. **With Jesus, faithfulness (staying with Him) overcomes everything.** Every failure, every frustration, even defeat and death mean nothing: this world passes, Jesus is forever. As Christians we are fully committed to acting now, but detaching our egos from results. We serve and wait, for Jesus to reveal what is next! We do our best, and trust God for the rest. The Cross teaches that, for who saw the cross coming, as the Way to the Kingdom! Yet, Jesus said, on the cross, **"This day you will be with me in paradise!"**(Luke 23:43). The Cross Paradise? **Every Day with Jesus, is paradise!** Keep in mind 'Many Rooms!' We do what we can, and then detach, surrendering to God's Will (it is only ego and self-importance that clings to glory/results). Consider God's eternal perspective. As Mother Teresa showed through her every gesture, "God didn't ask me to be successful, he just asked me to be faithful!" Maybe I won't do 'great things', but in all the things I do, love great!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: What stayed with me from Mass today? Did any words, any experiences or any commitments to action stick with me for the coming week?

Monday: 1 Peter 5:7 "Cast your worries on Him, for He cares for you!" Have you started your week by turning over the outcomes and results of your labors to God?

Tuesday: Seek above all today, to follow Jesus' Way! Speak His words, do his deeds!

Wednesday: Did I dedicate time today to read God's word, pray and seek the will of God?

Thursday: Has anyone asked directions of me today? If so, how did I interact with them? Was I helpful as a good guide? Or did I ask for direction from anyone today? Why not?

Friday: Perform an act of sacrifice or penance for someone you do not know.

Saturday: Consider coming to Mass early and pray the Rosary with others for world peace!

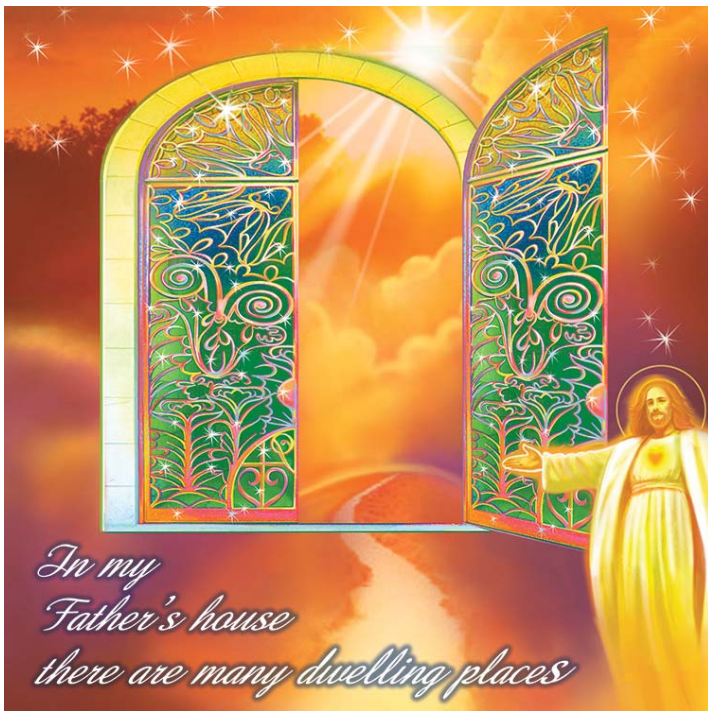
PRAYER AND SPIRITUALITY

A Word from Pope Francis:

"The Two disciples on the road to Emmaus were disappointed and discouraged, and they could not believe that their Master and Savior, who had raised others from the dead and healed the sick, would end up hanging on the cross of shame. They could not understand why Almighty God had not saved him from such a disgraceful death. The cross of Christ was the death of their own ideas about God; the death of Christ was the death of what they thought God to be. **But in fact, it was they who were dead**, buried in the tomb of their limited understanding. How often do we paralyze ourselves by refusing to transcend our own ideas of God, a god-idea we create in our own likeness? How often do we despair by refusing to believe that God's omnipotence is not one of power and authority, but rather of love, forgiveness and life! (Homily 4-30-2017)

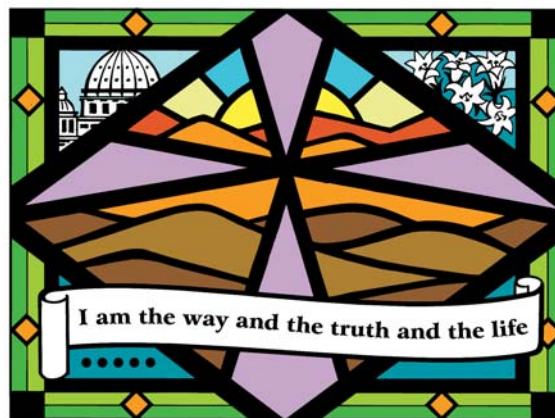

Ever wonder if you were born for misery? If so, cancel that concern: Jesus says we are destined for joy. Joy is one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit (along with love, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control) that demonstrate how well we are living under the Spirit's guidance. The more we surrender to the wisdom of the indwelling Spirit, the more joy will flower in our lives. If you're looking for a good role model in this, follow people whose joy has no end and is not dependent on their circumstances.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 15:7-21; John 15:9-11 (288). "I have said these things so that my joy may be in you, and your joy may be complete."

Can you get that call?

There's a lot of holiness in the church, and it's not only leaders or the women and men in consecrated life but all of us. Too often we think that the "chosen" of God are the ones who are in vowed religious life or ministry positions. Yet the gospel truth is that God calls each of us. Every one of us is invited to respond to God in faith and love and to serve God in all that we are and do. Ask yourself how God has been calling you. In what ways have you responded? How might the Spirit be encouraging you to tend to a newly emerging need or possibility?

SATURDAY, MAY 20 MEMORIAL OF BERNARDINE OF SIENA, PRIEST

Cultivate saintly smarts

No wonder Bernardine (1380-1444) is a patron saint of public relations—professionals who use a positive spin to persuade people. Though he embraced the poverty and humility of Saint Francis of Assisi, he was "sensitive to the demands of secular life, and tried to negotiate between Christian ethics and a conflicting code of honor that stressed retaining face in a public world," says a biographer. A persuasive preacher, he got Italy's warring families to replace their coats of arms with tablets bearing "I.H.M.," the Holy Name of Jesus. When a painter of playing cards went bankrupt because Bernardine turned people off gambling, Bernardine made him wealthy by persuading him to paint I.H.M. tablets. Can we be as savvy, bringing Jesus' way to worldly ways?

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 16:1-10; John 15:18-21 (290). "You do not belong to the world, but I have chosen you out of the world."

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
