When I was younger, my faith was very important; but lately I don't feel that closeness to God. Is this a crisis of faith?

How has your life changed since childhood? Do you feel, react, and appreciate things today as you did then? Spirituality is an ordinary part of human experience, and I hope you discover that the God of your youth, although remembered fondly, is not the God of your adult experience.

Many adults discover that their understanding, decisions, and behaviors have expanded and matured. In the interplay of the demands of society and culture, we are forced to grow and develop. What worked for us as a child of five is not usually what we would choose today.

In the spiritual journey, we are not so much forced but invited to grow and mature. Some people miss the invitation and get stuck in a rut. They may cling to childlike images of God and still expect such images to serve them well. The consequences of this are not easily recognized until moments of crisis or dramatic change, when the result is often reflected by the question, "Where is God?"

So it's not so much a crisis of faith but a realization of the desire to pursue (again) the spiritual journey. Begin to relate to God as an adult. Use your skills and knowledge to build a new relationship with God, the Church, and the community of believers. You will discover a living faith, an experience of God, that is important and meaningful for you now.

Words from the Pastor

+JMJ+

"What you see is what you get!" Or, "the proof is in the pudding!" How many times have we heard those sayings? But, how true it is that credibility is proven by time or the test of actual work. Sometimes just asking another question and taking a better look provides all the proof needed for conviction (in the saying, 'proof is in the pudding'-as you eat and digest it, you know what you have!) Jesus says in Matthew 7:16 "Do people pick grapes from thorn-bushes, or figs from thistles? By their fruits you will know them." The testimony is in the tasting! So as John's disciples ask whether Jesus is the 'One-Savior', John says, "Go and see for yourselves."

"Lights on, main stage!" What happens in this exchange between John and his disciples is a shift and move from John's ministry to Jesus' ministry, from the opener to the main event. Imagine John as the preview to the movie and Jesus **is** the movie! So now it begins. John's disciples go to Jesus looking for signs of the Kingdom, and they find them! Similar to Jesus' own statement of introduction in his home synagogue when he rolled out his mission by quoting Isaiah 61 that his anointing meant '**bringing glad tidings to the poor, proclaiming liberty to captives, recovery of sight to the blind, setting free the oppressed and proclaiming a year acceptable to the Lord**' (Luke 4:18), here John says 'go see the Kingdom Live in Jesus'. The Mission begins!

Often questions are asked about John seeming to be in the dark about Jesus: "Doesn't John already know Jesus is the Messiah? Why does he need to send his followers to ask? Is it a moment of weakness for John, doubting, or depressed in jail wondering if his ministry was in vain?" The answer to all of these is "Absolutely, John knows Jesus." He has pointed Jesus out before to his disciples (Behold the Lamb of God' John 1:29), he actually baptized Jesus and has a blood relation to Jesus through his mother Elizabeth. So, no doubt, John knows Jesus. BUT, apparently his disciples were slower to accept Jesus, so John arranges personal meetings. He sends his own disciples to go see for themselves the Kingdom signs with Jesus. This is the transfer of mission and the joining up of forces—John's followers teaming up in the company of Jesus now. Sometimes we humans are resistant or hesitant to embrace a new direction or accept a new face, so John was helping his followers jump on board with Jesus. Just being in Jesus' presence, seeing his work, any follower of John would instantly find 'kingdom credibility' and join Jesus. So conviction and acceptance come natural in Jesus' presence!

Jesus reinforces John's message to the crowds about genuine credentials, testifying to John's faithfulness by living what he taught, to the point of great self-sacrifice. John and Jesus say about each other, "He is the real deal!" Talking about John's integrity, Jesus says, "John is a political prisoner in jail, and Herod is a pampered palace dweller, doesn't that say something?" In Jesus' own words, he says, "What did you go out to the desert to see? A reed swayed by the wind? Then what did you go out to see? Someone dressed in fine clothing?" (Matthew 11:7-8). What sways in the winds, and lives in luxurious clothing? It is King Herod the politician whose beliefs change with the winds of polls and self-gain, and who lives soft and plush off other people's work. Jesus is saying 'Watch! Strength

and sacrifice prove the message'. John is in jail, and Herod is in the palace. Who is living and leading with integrity? Herod was willing to corrupt, even deny his faith by collaborating with the exploitative Romans to the point of even killing his own people (John is case in point—John called out Herod on Herod's politically convenient marriage entered for the increase of his power and dynasty, and Herod jailed and killed him for it). So Jesus takes right up where John left off, continuing to stand for truth and justice to the point of death to **save** his people (John 18:37 "For this reason I was born, to testify to the truth.") Jesus invites John's followers to stay on board the Kingdom Train, and through conversion to works of justice & mercy to bring in the New Covenant. Jesus lays it on the line, like saying "John is gone, so who are you going to follow? Do you want Herod's kingdom or God's kingdom?" Herod brings a good show and nice parade, but the Messiah brings true justice and peace to the earth." Those who sign on and stay with Jesus to the end, will see the Kingdom Revealed and find their place in it! Jesus says in Matthew 5:10 "Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." Time and work reveal the truth. Similar to Jesus reminding us that we will know others by their fruit, he also says in Luke 7:35 "Wisdom is vindicated by all her children." All of this and more, is what Jesus means when he simply says "Come and See" (John 1:46).

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: Was I stirred by some word or thought in today's mass? The scripture, a song or some word shared by a neighbor? What am I going to do about it?

Monday: How can I keep my faith alive today as I go back to work or school?

Tuesday: What will I do today to better prepare for Christmas coming?

Wednesday: Who is a prophet for our time, or in our society? Who stirs us to turn to God?

Thursday: Have I been willing to sacrifice for the truth or to stand strong for justice?

Friday: Perform some act of mercy or anonymous act of kindness for someone today.

Saturday: What am I going to thank God for at Mass this weekend?

Anointing of the Sick Offered at Weekend Mass on December 10-11. We look forward to praying with and anointing any ill or suffering parishioners at masses the weekend of December 10-11, as we offer the anointing sacrament of the sick.

Sometimes people ask who can be anointed, and the Church teaches that those who are seriously ill or suffering a chronic illness, preparing for surgery or recovering from surgery can be anointed for healing and comfort.

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT; GAUDETE SUNDAY Joyful anticipation

Gaudete is Latin for “Rejoice!” The church tells us to rejoice, but not in a be-happy-on-demand kind of way. Advent gives you a *reason* to be joyful, as you are when you know that someone who deeply loves you is on her or his way. It is anticipation; it

is hope that comes from trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled. Is there a promise you need to fulfill, someone who is waiting for your visit, a phone call, a letter? Don’t wait until Christmas to bring someone joy—not with a material gift, but with a simple reminder that God is good.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Isaiah 35:1-6a, 10; James 5:7-10; Matthew 11:2-11 (Z)*. “*They will meet with joy and gladness, sorrow and mourning will flee.*”

FEAST OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

Am I not here?

When Mary appeared to Juan Diego on Tepeyak Hill on the outskirts of present-day Mexico City, she said to him, “Don’t be afraid. Am I, who am your Mother, not here?” She also said, “Know for certain that I am the perfect and perpetual Virgin Mary, Mother of the True God,” and she called him, “my little one.” Juan Diego was not a little boy—he was a grown man. Still he was Mary’s “little one.” Mary is our Mother. And if she is our Mother, why are we afraid? Seems so simple, yet for many it is a profound realization. And no matter how old we are, we are still Mary’s “little ones.” Spend some time with your Mother Mary and thank her for being with us.

MEMORIAL OF LUCY, VIRGIN, MARTYR

Let your light shine

In the darkness of these Advent days, Saint Lucy stands as a shining example of the gift of faith in this world. Martyred in fourth-century Italy after being outed as a Christian by a disappointed suitor, Lucy is one of only seven women included in the original Eucharistic Prayer. Said to have worn a crown of candles into the dark catacombs of Rome to serve the poor, Lucy reminds us that bringing light into the darkness of the world is a costly venture. Faith, though, calls us to shine bright, no matter the cost.

Respect reformers

John of the Cross is revered with one of the highest honors possible, named a “Doctor of the church” as a saint of particularly high importance. Yet during his life, a group of superiors from his own order who opposed his visionary reforms forcibly imprisoned him and subjected him to cruel treatment and public lashings in front of his community. Perhaps as John sat in his cold, dark jail cell, Jesus’ line about prophets being honored except in their home town came to

mind. Be slow to criticize modern-day reformers; perhaps they have a message we need to hear.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Isaiah 45:6c-8, 18, 21c-25; Luke 7:18b-23 (189)*. “*Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?*”

Prophet-able thoughts

Do you think about prophets like you do about fortune-tellers? Prophets predict the future, right? Well, not in God’s world they don’t. God’s prophets have the job of making people aware that God wants to be first in everyone’s life. God has a call and an invitation for everyone. Today, when the temptation is to focus on the 10 shopping days until Christmas, what do you think John the Baptist would say to call your attention to God’s presence in your daily life? In the eyes of God, what really matters on this Advent day? Ask today for the grace to see God’s presence around you.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Isaiah 54:1-10; Luke 7:24-30 (190)*. “*I send my messenger ahead of you to prepare your way before you.*”

Let your light shine

Jesus told his followers not to hide their “lamp under a bushel.” But why would anyone shield their inner light? Perhaps we fear that we’re not worthy of the greatness of being a child of God, says author Marianne Williamson. “Your playing small doesn’t serve the world,” she writes. “There’s nothing enlightened about shrinking so that other people won’t feel insecure around you.” In her book, *A Return to Love*, she urges everyone to “make manifest the glory of God that is within us” and “give other people permission to do the same.”

TODAY’S READINGS: *Isaiah 56:1-3a, 6-8; John 5:33-36 (191)*. “*John was a burning and shining lamp.*”

The Magi begin their long trek across the East, and we’re glad to honor these Wise Men of old.
