What happened to "hellfire and brimstone" preaching, like I remember from parish missions in my younger years?

Hellfire and brimstone recalls Genesis 19:24: "The Lord rained down sulfur upon Sodom and Gomorrah, fire from the Lord out of heaven." It refers to a harsh preaching style and "doom and gloom" content focused on God's wrath, punishment, and hell. Puritans—those English Calvinists who colonized Massachusetts in the 1600s—adhered strongly to their belief in eternal damnation, innate sin, and diabolical power. Likewise, American Baptists were known to "out-Calvin Calvin" in their preaching.

While Catholics also adhere strongly to our belief in the possibility of eternal damnation, innate sin, and evil forces, we believe in the grace of baptism to remove original sin, the outpouring of God's grace to strengthen our weakness due to original sin, and in the extraordinary power of conversion to prevent everlasting damnation. To that end, parish missions and revivals strengthen the spiritual life of the faithful and welcome lapsed Catholics.

Preaching orders have been conducting missions since their earliest days in America. Saint Alphonsus encouraged his Redemptorist missionaries to be lions in the pulpit and lambs in the confessional. One preacher in the 1850s described the fires of hell with such intensity that the nearby fire engine crew was mistakenly dispatched to the church to extinguish the conflagration. Yet the fire most desirable during a mission is the one in people's hearts for God. "Fear of God" means a dread for God's judgment, but it can also mean a reverential marvel for God. Many preachers today prefer to instill that awe for God's inviting mercy instead of a paralyzing fear of God's anger



Words from the Pastor

Lazarus, Come out!, Jesus said! The next words out of the mouth of Jesus were, "Untie him and let him go!" Way more, than just setting Lazarus free, Jesus raised Lazarus from the **dead**. We have been hearing about the gifts of Easter in our three week cycle of readings. The Woman at the Well revealed the **gift of forgiveness** and *having our past reconciled*, the Man born Blind revealed the **gift of enlightenment** and *our eyes being opened to new things* and today Lazarus reveals the **gift of new life, and being set free from death and decay**. 'Set Free!' That is a powerful phrase! Jesus tells us in John 8:32 'the truth will set you free!' We may ask, 'Set free from what?' Each person will provide the answer. Whatever is untrue, whatever is illusory, whatever is 'fake' about us, Jesus removes those burdens that 'take life' from us. What do you need to be set free from? Maybe we need release from a particular sin, a haunting guilt-ridden event from our past, a binding addiction, an abusively possessive relationship, an oppressive judgement imposed upon us by others' opinions, or a consuming bitterness over a past injury we just can't let go of ourselves? Whatever binds us: the Lazarus experience reveals that Jesus can break through and overcome. I notice an increasing progression each week in these stories as Jesus' power of love overcomes greater and greater obstacles. First, his forgiveness and honesty breaks through past guilt and emotional brokenness of the woman in addition to the already *burdensome, hurtful gossip the villagers judged against her*. Then, Jesus' healing and courage breaks through *the physical blindness and social exclusion of the blind man*. Jesus also offered healing to the self-righteous double vision of the Pharisees and crowds. And today, Jesus' almighty creativity, and through his vulnerable sharing of his own heart with Mary, Martha and the others, Jesus breaks through the grip of death and the cynical doubt of the Jewish mob to raise Lazarus to new life. At the same time, He challenged the community to rise out of the past, opening themselves to new life in Him (not the stale, old security of the Pharisaic Law). Jesus' progressive revelation of life with Him leads us to Easter. Jesus invites us to reflect upon **what these Easter gifts can do for us**: forgive, heal and endow with power to begin anew!

Many details link these three readings together. I simply point out one of them today: Christ's love 'in extremis'. Christ's **'farthest reach'** of love to overcome the steepest obstacle. St John in the 4th gospel says it this way, "He loved his own in the world and **he loved them to the end**" (13:1). St Paul describes **God's extreme love of us**, and this love's extreme power to overcome all obstacles in Romans 8:38-39 "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus." Basically, **nothing can separate us from the love of Christ, except our own refusal of His Offer!** If we accept his offer, no sin, no blindness, no hardness, no

obstacle, not even death is greater than the almighty love of God to reach our lives, forgive us, open us and raise us to new life! These three stories show us the extremes that Jesus overcomes. For example, notice that the woman did not have one broken relationship needing healing, she had six. The man was not just temporarily blind after some accident, or slowly losing his sight. No, he had been blind from birth-never had sight, never had seen anything, not even light. And then Lazarus is not just recently passed, not in some deep comatose state, not sick to death. No, Lazarus is dead-dead, and been in the tomb for over four days! All of these cases are extreme! But, Jesus doesn't flinch; he doesn't back away from complication. He embraces these messy human situations and overcomes them! If we have similar messes, Jesus loves us through them-to the end! While we may be opposed or put down by many things, Jesus overcomes if we let Him! Notice the woman at the well was put down by the prejudice and unfair judgements of her village, the blind man was put out and excommunicated by the Pharisees and shunned by the crowds/family, and Mary & Martha were belittled by the neighbors and ridiculed by the Jews. We didn't hear it today but if you read into John's next chapter, you will hear that Lazarus will even be hunted down to be killed because he testifies to Jesus (see John 12:10-11). But Jesus overcomes, loving us into true lasting friendship and overcoming all sin, personal and social! This Easter Jesus says to us all, "Come to Me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." What do we need to have forgiven in our lives; what do we need to have our eyes opened, to see new, and what do we need to be set free from to rise new with Christ?

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: Following Mass, did I feel God call me to any different action in my life? Did I hear a call to greater service of Him through some specific act I can share with someone?

Monday: As I begin a new work week, what am I taking to the shop or the office in my heart? Do I have a good word or attitude to spread among my co-workers?

Tuesday: Jesus expressed his feelings openly and honestly. He both wept and became perturbed in this reading. Am I open and honest with myself about feelings?

Wednesday: Martha was outside of the house and Mary was inside. What does that say about each of their personalities? Do we identify more with one or the other?

Thursday: Jesus said 'Untie him!' is there anything I need to be untied from (addiction, binding stress or weighty worry) and set free from by Easter?

Friday: Perform an act of sacrifice or penance for the good benefit of someone else today.

Saturday: For what am I especially thankful for this week? Prepare a list of thanks to share with God in prayer at Mass tonight, and let someone else know of your gratitude.



Communal Penance Services:





What should a parent do with a fussy/crying child? FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Earthen vessels

When we hear talk of *flesh* in scripture, we usually think of it as the human body, our flesh and bones. Saint Paul often pits flesh against spirit in his Letters. If at those times we understand Paul's references to flesh to be referring to the body only, we would believe our bodies to be rather nasty indeed. But the news isn't that bad. By *flesh* Paul means "self-centeredness" versus *spirit*, or "God-centeredness." Are we oriented toward ourselves or to the ways of God? If the first option is true for us, then our physical existence, bodies included, can be a drag on our spirit. If we look to God, though, before all else, then our material lives, bodies included, become sacred vessels that house the divine.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 37:12-14; Romans 8:8-11; John 11:1-45 (34). "You are in the spirit, if only the Spirit of God dwells in you."

MONDAY, APRIL 3

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Drop it!

In one of the most dramatic moments in scripture, Jesus comes face-to-face with a woman caught in adultery. But because her accusers are only using her as a tool to trap Jesus, he confronts a second and greater sin: the eagerness to judge. At Jesus' invitation—"let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her"—at least those in the crowd were honest enough to let the rocks drop. Being sinless does not lead Jesus to condemn sinners. It leads to forgiving them, showing them how to live without the sin that can destroy. In Lent we scrutinize ourselves for signs of self-righteousness—something we must drop like a heavy stone.

TODAY'S READINGS: Deuteronomy 13:1-9, 15-17, 19-30, 33-62; John 8:1-11 (251). "In response, they went away one by one."

School yourself in divine wisdom

There are some who would like to add Divine Intelligence theory, or creationism, to the curriculum to counter the teachings of the theory of evolution, which they contend is contrary to the biblical teachings of the origin of man. Saint Isidore 1,500 years ago assured us that there is no contradiction in God's world between so-called book learning and heart wisdom, what we learn about the world and how we experience God. We can see God's presence in all creation and in all that we learn from science and faith.

TODAY'S READINGS: Numbers 21:4-9; John 8:21-30 (252). "The one who sent me is true, and I declare to the world what I have heard from him."

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 5

MEMORIAL OF VINCENT FERRER, PRIEST

Gracefully reconcile

Reconciliation means bringing things or people into some kind of harmony. The Dominican Saint Vincent (1350-1419) practiced reconciliation on many levels. He traveled around preaching repentance. "When you have realized your true worth," he said, "you will be able to judge your faults sanely . . . and the faults of your neighbor will remain in shadow." Seeing the shortcomings of others, Vincent reminds us, begins with seeing our own limitations clearly. That perspective can then

lead us to gracefulness in accepting criticism and tact in giving it.

TODAY'S READINGS: Daniel 3:14-20, 91-92, 95; John 8:31-42 (253). "If you were Abraham's children, you would be doing the works of Abraham."

Pleased to meet you

The second Commandment warns against using the Lord's name in vain. When Jesus refers to himself as "I AM," as he does many times in John's gospel, he is deliberately associating himself with God, who revealed the divine name to Moses as "I AM WHO I AM." This strange-sounding name declares that God's absolute existence depends upon nothing and no one. It puts God in a unique category, because the rest of us are dependent and fragile creatures. Give thanks today for all the ways your life is nourished and sustained by God's unshakeable presence.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 17:3-9; John 8:51-59 (254). "Very truly, I tell you, before Abraham was, I am."

What to do?

Some struggle to shed a few more bad habits every year so as to creep closer to the spiritual ideals over a lifetime. Jesus says if we trust in him, we'll always know what to do.

The Caiaphas inside us all

Caiaphas, the Jewish high priest who presided at the trial of Jesus, saw Jesus as a threat to his own power and privilege. So he took advantage of his close relationship with Pontius Pilate to persuade the latter to condemn Jesus to crucifixion. Though it is easy enough to dislike Caiaphas based on the biblical testimony, we do well to recognize a bit of ourselves in him. Lent is a good time to reflect on how we protect our power and privilege in ways that hurt others. Before condemning Caiaphas let's make sure we haven't done the same thing to Jesus in our own hearts!
