Does the Church allow sick and elderly people to have "do not resuscitate (DNR)" orders?

Yes. The Church understands the human person as a union of body and soul. Made in God's image and likeness, we cannot separate our physical life from our spiritual life. When our bodies die, our spiritual existence continues. Thus, to believe that we are morally bound to exhaust all possible medical treatments incorrectly overemphasizes the good of our physical life here on earth—which our faith teaches comprises, in the end, shadows and dust—and overlooks the good of our spiritual life as well as the eternal destiny to which we are called by God.

There comes a time when medical intervention, beyond that required to keep a person comfortable and to relieve pain, is unnecessary and can excessively burden the patient or the family. Elderly and imminently dying patients are not obligated to undertake unreasonable or excessively burdensome medical procedures or to use measures that sustain life beyond basic nursing care such as proper hygiene, food and fluids (when they can be assimilated into the body), comfortable room temperature, turning to avoid bed sores, and other means.

Having conversations with loved ones about this matter is an excellent way to find support during times of suffering and loss. "Do not resuscitate (DNR)" orders can be part of the process of letting go of the life we have known while embracing the new life that awaits us in Jesus Christ.

Happy Easter, again! We keep saying this until Pentecost, as we have a whole season to celebrate God's love shared with us through Jesus' death on the cross! We call today **Divine Mercy Sunday**, because God's love continues to be "*poured out*" upon us in each appearance of Jesus after His resurrection. The cross began the outpouring, as St John tells us in his gospel chapter 19 verse 34 "*one soldier*

thrust his lance into his side, and immediately blood and water flowed out." Blood and Water flowed out! Two things to think about here 1.) Blood and Water and 2) the action of flowing out. Many people see this scene as the transformation of John's baptism from merely an outward sign of a simple washing baptism to Jesus' complete re-birth, internally life-giving baptism. When I imagine this shower of blood-water flowing from Jesus, I can't help but think of where else a person could see lots of blood and water, like when a baby is born. Of course, the amniotic birth fluid contains water and blood, especially as the placenta emerges and the umbilical cord is cut. My point is that I see Jesus' cross as a birth scene of His Church: His followers. And who is there? His own Blessed Mother, and that faithful, beloved disciple (John?). And what had Jesus just said? He introduced this birth idea Himself by giving His Mother and the Beloved Disciple to one another as New Family. John 19:26-27 reads 'He said to His mother, 'Woman, behold, your son.' Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother". Jesus is birthing a new family and relationship to God now available to us in Him. Let's bring in that second detail of water and blood actually 'flowing out' upon us from Him on the cross. The 'flowing out' is an action like a 'covering', 'surrounding', 'enveloping'. Jesus is immersing us into His life through the outpouring of his heart. As he prayed Psalm 22 on the cross, he would have said "Like water my life drains away;...My heart has become like wax, it melts away...."(Psalm 22:15). Jesus, opens His Life with the Father (God) to us by pouring out Himself in death for us, to bring about **our rebirth** anew in communion with Him. United in Christ by water and blood, we become part of a new and reconciled greater family of God. Differences are overcome, oppositions are reconciled. After Jesus' atoning death for us, we have to ask, "Is blood thicker than water, or is water thicker than blood?" as they say. Our baptismal belonging to Christ, creates a new deeper and stronger bond than biological identification. But add to this the detail of the 'flowing out upon us' from the cross. This action reveals a, 'surrounding', 'enveloping', 'embracing' or 'immersing' presence of God to us. This 'covering' of us by Christ is the same as what he means saying, "**I am with you always**" (Matthew 28:20) or "that they may be one, as we are one, **I in them and you in me**" (John 17:22-23). But in case this wasn't understood by the Church at the scene of the cross, Jesus repeats such an 'outpouring' in his first appearance to the gathered disciples that Easter afternoon we read in today's Divine Mercy gospel. John

20:21-22 reads "Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' And when he had said this, **he breathed on them** and said to them, "**Receive** the holy Spirit." Here's another gesture of 'covering' and surrounding, as Jesus "**BREATHES**" upon them, giving them His Spirit. Now **both inside and outside**, the followers of Jesus have been infused and enwrapped By His Divine Presence. So we find water, blood and now Spirit bringing about our new life in God's Family! But no surprise, for just as 1 John 5:7-8 says "For there are three that testify: the Spirit, the water, and the blood — and these three are in agreement." We are one in Christ by all three! Yet, even more, Jesus establishes the meaning and purpose of this life of Him in them, by commissioning them to serve the world in His Name. Jesus gives them a mandate of service. John 20:19, Jesus says, "Peace be with you. **As the Father has sent me, so I send you.**" But we might ask, "Send us to do what?" Jesus' next line in verse 23 gives us our work, "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." Our holy work in His Name is 'forgiveness of sins'. We are called to serve by reconciling ourselves, reconciling others, bringing together what is divided by sin. Divine Mercy unites, overcoming selfishness and dissolving oppositions. Jesus gives Himself, to draw back together what came apart through sin, and we are called to take up that same 'reconciling work' of making whole what is apart. Ephesians 2:14-15 says it this way, "For Christ is our peace, he who made both one and broke down the dividing wall of enmity, through his flesh (on the cross),creating in himself one new person in place of the two, thus establishing **peace**." That is Divine Mercy, giving, to make one again; sacrificing, to make peace and restoring new life from death and sin. What a wonderful God we have to reveal His care of us through loving us back to life!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!
Sunday: What was my most heartfelt prayer at Mass today? Continue to offer it every day this week. Was it a prayer for someone else, or was it a personal intention? Ask for God's Spirit to discern if it is already being answered.
Monday: Am I returning to work refreshed and renewed by celebrating the risen life of Christ?
Tuesday: How did Lent change me? Have I been able to keep my Lenten sacrifices up as a sign of my ongoing conversion and changed life in Christ? If not, am I more aware of it?
Wednesday: Recall a time you received 'pure mercy'. How did the experience change you and help you see all life completely made over in light of a new beginning?
Thursday: How do I practice 'acts of mercy' toward others? Share one today with someone.
Friday: Perform an act of sacrifice or penance for the good benefit of someone else today.
Saturday: Plan to arrive at Mass early and offer the rosary for world peace and the conversion of sin into grace and death in to life in this Easter season.

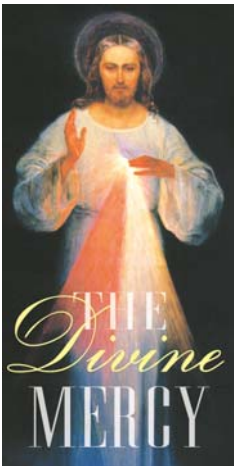

A Word from Pope Francis:

"Gospel-A single word – The Good News- that, even as it is spoken, becomes truth, brimming with joy and mercy. This message can never be gloomy or indifferent, for it expresses a joy that is completely personal. It is "the joy of the Father, who desires that none of his little ones be lost" (EG, 237). It is the joy of Jesus, who sees that the poor have the good news preached to them, and that the little ones go out to preach the message in turn (ibid., 5) The joys of the Gospel are special joys. ***I say "joys" in the plural, for they are many and varied,*** depending on how the Spirit chooses to communicate them, in every age, to every person and in every culture" (Chrim Mass Homily 4-13-2017)

Mass Etiquette Column

Are Catholics supposed to shake hands during the sign of peace? "As for the sign of peace to be given, the manner is to be established by Conferences of Bishops in accordance with the culture and customs of the peoples. It is, however, appropriate that each person offer the sign of peace only to those who are nearest and in a sober manner." (GIRM 82) The USCCB has the authority to establish a particular sign as the official form of the rite in the US, but have never done so, leaving the unofficial custom of the handshake in place. Other gestures are also appropriate. It should not become a free-for-all meet-and-greet.

Live in the mystery

Musing about the ideal frame of mind for artists and writers, the English romantic poet John Keats wrote that they must be “capable of being in uncertainties, mysteries, doubts without any irritable reaching after fact and reason.” He called this state “negative capability.” The prospect of abiding in uncertainty might feel uncomfortable for us ordinary folks, but Keats understood that where uncertainty, mystery, and doubt exist, anything can happen. It’s the place where miracles are possible; in fact it’s where the risen Christ resides. As the church continues the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus, today might be a good day to ponder Keats’ idea.

MEMORIAL OF FIDELIS OF SIGMARINGEN, PRIEST, MARTYR

Fidelis of Sigmaringen (1577-1622) was martyred during a time of great strife between Calvinists and Catholics in Switzerland. Fidelis had a special love of the poor, often giving away his warm clothing in winter. An early and enduring giant

Saint Mark the evangelist was one of the first 70 disciples. He is believed to have written the Gospel of Mark, our earliest gospel. But he didn’t stop there. He also founded the Church of Alexandria in Egypt back in the year 42, a few years after Jesus’ death. Alexandria became one of the great centers of early Christianity. Today three churches claim to be the direct heirs of the original Church of Alexandria: Coptic Orthodox, Eastern Orthodox, and Coptic Catholic. Saint Mark looms large behind them all, a giant of our tradition. Take him as your inspiration as you write your own “gospel” by living your faith in the world.

Look it up

John 3:16 (“For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son . . .”) is perhaps the best-known scripture verse. A group in Alabama made a video of a bunch of guys noticing a sign with that Bible verse on it and looking it up on a smartphone to find out what it means. The video was rejected as a Super Bowl commercial because it promoted a particular religion,

which may be true. But it would have been a good reminder. Sometimes we have to hold up a sign, make a phone call, visit a sick friend, or forgive a loved one in order to help one another see who is already among us.
