

When I was a kid there was an educational TV commercial (School House Rock) that taught about English grammar and proper sentence structure with a catchy song, "Conjunction junction, what's your function?" Remember it? Maybe more fitting to our current political time is another popular one that taught about the legislative process of good government called 'I'm just a bill, sittin' here on capitol hill'! When we hear today's reading, we may

think up our own ditty, "***Transfiguration Duplication!***" Because, didn't we just hear this reading on a Sunday back in Spring? Yes! The second Sunday of Lent is always the Transfiguration account reading, as it looks forward to the Resurrection! The Transfiguration event did that for Peter, James and John to prepare them and help them be ready for the even greater things to come from Christ than that one 'mountain-top' revelation! That is why Jesus tells them in verse 9, "As they were coming down from the mountain, Jesus charged them, ***Do not tell the vision to anyone until*** the Son of Man has been raised from the dead." Why not tell anyone? First, would anyone outside the circle of disciples believe it yet anyway? Jesus is saying to the apostles that the world is not ready to receive or believe the truth of His divine identity (or ***their*** role in sharing the kingdom). Jesus tells them not to be surprised about others' disbelief, rejection and even persecution of them. In John 10:25, he says publicly, "I have told you (the world) and ***you do not believe.***" Then he told the apostles specifically in John 15:18 that when "the world hates you, realize that it ***hated me first.***" And he follows that up by preparing them for worse, when he says in John 15:20 ***If they persecuted me, they will also persecute you.***" So, why not tell the vision of the Transfiguration to the entire world? Because it is not time, as Jesus says so often "My hour has not yet come"(John 2:4, 7:30; 8:20). It is not 'full revelation- time' yet! But Jesus does not want the apostles to be unprepared, so he gives them glimpses of His divinity (through all of His other miracles) along the way to strengthen them, like booster shots of faith.

Think of the Transfiguration as a 'peak experience' to remind you of what can happen and to uplift you when you feel you are in the valley! Feeling low? Remember a high time, and say, 'This too, shall pass!' A peak experience for me, anytime, is to be able to sit on a river bank (most likely) or on a sea shore (less likely) and listen to the water waves break along the beach. The regularity of the sound is comforting. But what is more exhilarating is the thought that I am only hearing *the slightest piece* of the action of what is really going on all along the surface and most ***especially underneath the water.*** The last 'ocean experience' I had was about thirteen years ago, after I had a retreat among the Benedictine monks of St Bernard Abbey, Cullman Alabama. I figured I would drive on to Panama City, Florida for a day or two after the retreat ***on my way home!*** But mostly I just wanted to have that early morning experience of hearing the ocean waves break on the shore as the sun rose. Of course, it was worth it as a 'further peak experience after the retreat (Look what it still means to me today!) So, Peter James and John have this mountain top revelation to strengthen them for what lies ahead of them and as personal

confirmation of who Jesus is as Divine Savior. He is with them and us! Everything is going to be okay!

Have you ever wondered why it was Peter, James, and John that went up that mountain alone with Jesus? Because of their unique leadership positions among the Early Church. St Paul refers to them in his letter to the Galatians 2:9 as those "who were reputed to be pillars of the church". St Peter, of course as 'chief shepherd' (1st Pope) in Rome, St James, head of local church in Jerusalem, and St John, leader of church in Ephesus and guardian of the Blessed Mother. As the next leaders of Jesus' church, He was bolstering their faith through this personal revelation of His Divine Identity!

Still, how about the question of this gospel reading being repeated on two Sundays this year? Well, certain Holy days pre-empt and take precedence over Ordinary Sundays, replacing the regular readings, the proper prayers and normal music. In addition to the High Holy Days of Obligation (which are only we Jan 1-Mary, Mother of God, Aug 15-Assumption of Virgin Mary, Nov 1-All Saints Day, Dec 8-Immaculate Conception and Dec 25-Christmas), the solemn feasts also take precedence over regular Sundays. These universal feast days are Feb 2-Presentation of the Lord, Jun 29- Sts Peter & Paul, Aug 6-Transfiguration of the Lord, Sept 14-Exaltation of the Holy Cross, Nov 2-All Souls Day and Nov 9-Dedication of St John Lateran Basilica. So, it is not very often, but it does come up every once in a while that one of these special days falls on Sunday. So, their special readings, prayers and music take over the regular schedule! And that is what happens today-kind of like the solar eclipse (total for some) we are all about to experience on August 21, that will likely take over routines for a day. But as with everything, soon after we will pick right back up with the 'ordinary' and keep moving along!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: Was I moved to any particular action this week from listening closely to the gospel and from my personal prayer?

Monday: Recall a high point or strong faith experience you have had. Did it comfort and carry you through a low point or difficult struggle you went through sometime?

Tuesday: Have you ever helped another person to have a 'peak experience' or reminded them of the 'good times' to help them through a bad one? Pray for them again, today.

Wednesday: Have I given good time this week each day to 'listen' to Jesus? Be sure to set aside some time to simply sit in silence and let God speak to you.

Thursday: Why do you think Moses and Elijah were up on the Mount with Jesus? What do they represent or bring to this revelatory encounter?

Friday: Make a loving sacrifice willingly for someone today without any recognition.

Saturday: Make a list of blessings to offer God thanks for at Mass this weekend. Come early to spend some time advance-reading the gospel or pray the rosary with others.

Anointing of the Sick-First Wednesdays of Month: Father Brian will begin offering on a monthly basis the sacrament of the sick, 'Anointing for Healing' at the first Wednesday evening mass (5:00pm). The first offering will be August 2nd. The Catechism specifies that those who can be anointed include 'anyone in danger of death from sickness or old age' yet also includes anyone 'prior to a serious operation', or 'for the elderly whose frailty becomes more pronounced' (Catechism #1514-1515).

Children's Liturgy: We had 3 teachers to step away from their positions as teachers for Children's Liturgy this last cycle. We are now in the process of trying to replace them before September when the classes start up again. Children's Liturgy of course is held March, April, May and then September, October and November. Safe Environment and a background check are required to work with the children. All questions and information can be gotten from the church office, stop by or call 270-756-2356, or you may contact Rosa Hockenberry at 270-314-1669 (cell) any hour of the day or week. Please take some time to prayerfully think over coming to join this very special ministry. Our children need you!



**FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD
The power of love**

On this day in 1945, humans unleashed a power so deadly that we've spent decades trying to prevent its use in warfare again. Here's how President Harry S. Truman described the bomb dropped on Hiroshima, Japan in a press release sent out 16 hours after the attack: "It is an atomic bomb. It is a harnessing of the basic power of the universe. The force from which the sun draws its power has been loosed against those who brought war to the Far East." Jesus, too, harnessed the power of the universe, but his energy was used to bring light and life. Pray for your enemies today, and call on God's power to help us transfigure hatred into love.

**MEMORIAL OF SIXTUS II, POPE, MARTYR
Power of the people**

When the Roman Empire hit hard times, Emperor Valerius ordered the execution of Christian leaders. The church, still young and wrangling over rules, was already agitated as persecution came. Enter Sixtus II, the pope trying to hold everything together, "a good and peace-loving priest," says one biographer. But enter, too, those who follow leaders—the mob, wielding a power all its own. Because Sixtus wanted to protect his assembled flock, he didn't flee the soldiers who stormed a worship service to behead him and his deacons. Crowds also moved Jesus to multiply loaves and fishes. If we must follow crowds, let's make them good ones.

**MEMORIAL OF DOMINIC, PRIEST
Mary and Martha shake hands**

The contest between action and contemplation in the spiritual life is an old one. Just think "Martha and Mary" and you get the picture. Saint Dominic (1170-1221) had the advantage of an early experience with contemplative life to shape his sense that the two impulses should be combined. When he founded his Order of Preachers, the idea was to fuel the ministry of itinerant preaching with a strong dedication to prayer and study. Dominicans today continue to model this unity of purpose. How do you balance the "ins-and-outs" of faith: praying and doing?

**MEMORIAL OF TERESA BENEDICTA OF THE CROSS,
VIRGIN, MARTYR**

A martyr of two faiths

Teresa Benedicta of the Cross (Edith Stein, 1891-1942) was a brilliant woman who earned a Ph.D. in philosophy. She was brought up Jewish, but during her student years she read Saint Teresa of Ávila's autobiography, and as a result she not only decided to become a Catholic but also joined the Carmelite order. After the Nazi invasion of the Netherlands, though the Carmelites tried to protect her, she was arrested because of her Jewish heritage. She was sent to Auschwitz, where she

was gassed. In contemplating the possibility she would be "driven out into the street," she wrote, "Certainly we ought to pray that we shall be spared the experience, but only with the deeply sincere addition, 'Not mine, but thy will be done.'"

**FEAST OF LAWRENCE, DEACON, MARTYR
The true wealth of the church**

Saint Lawrence was a deacon known as the keeper of the church's treasures. That means he disbursed donated alms to the needy. In August of 258 A.D., Emperor Valerian outlawed Christianity, and Roman authorities demanded that Lawrence turn over the wealth of the church. Lawrence appeared before the authorities followed by a multitude of Rome's crippled, blind, sick, and needy. He had given away everything the church possessed to these people and told his persecutors, "Here are the true treasures of the church." Though Lawrence was executed, this story is a reminder of the true treasures our church holds—all of us who need its tender care.

**MEMORIAL OF CLARE, VIRGIN
Are you imagining things? Good!**

Before Saint Clare's birth, one biographer wrote, it was revealed to her mother that the child "would be a brilliant light in the world." As abbess of the first convent of Franciscan sisters, Clare rose from her sickbed to pray for the protection of her sisters from marauders and heard a voice say, "I shall always watch over you." At her death in 1253 she saw the Virgin Mary coming to meet her. Were these things only products of the imagination? Even if they were, imagination is necessary to making something real. With faith, that imagination might soar all the way to heaven.

**MEMORIAL OF JANE FRANCES DE CHANTAL, RELIGIOUS
All God wants is our heart**

Widowed young and suddenly, Jane Frances de Chantal (1572-1641) faced a difficult life raising her six children alone. Then she chanced to hear Francis de Sales preach and became his lifelong friend. She was taken by the notion that "all God wants is our heart," and her writings are centered on the two facets of love: devotion to God and neighbor. She was convinced a life of simple contemplation would provide the grace necessary to serve others. She urged the victory over self-absorption with "great gentleness," never wanting to force or oblige. Pray for the gentle victory over the self today.
