***I want my children to be merciful and forgiving like Jesus, but I don't want them to be permissive of sin because someone else thinks it's OK. How can I teach this balance?***

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches, "Education in the faith by parents should begin in the child's earliest years. This already happens when family members help one another to grow in faith by the witness of a Christian life in keeping with the Gospel" (CCC 2226). The balance of advocating the magnitude of God's mercy without diminishing the severity of sin is best taught through witness.

You should hold your children accountable (and vice versa) and explain with loving candor how lax attitudes and actions have consequences. As we are taught in Proverbs 27:5, "Better is an open rebuke than a love that remains hidden."

An intimate relationship with God also helps. It's easier to instill greater compassion in ourselves and in others when we've experienced God's infinite mercy firsthand. Jesus asked the woman caught in adultery, "'Has no one condemned you?' She replied, 'No one, sir.' Then Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you. Go, [and] from now on do not sin any more'" (John 8:10- 11).

Christ loves the sinner and despises the sin—but he doesn't dwell on the sin. Instead, Jesus rejoices when sinners enter a newfound relationship with his merciful Father, knowing that the experience of God's mercy is the catalyst for ultimate change and lasting conversion, where neither the sinner is condemned nor the sin condoned. —Fr. Byron Miller, CSSR

Angry? Hurt? What is your plan? Isn't funny that we can have all kinds of plans: plans to vacation, plans to build onto the house, plans to upgrade our work skills, get certified in something and add a line on our resume, or even plans to retire; **YET**, we never draw up plans to work through our anger, or overcome our hurts and past injuries? So let me ask again, "Do you have any grudges? Any past resentment? Well now, what is your plan?" Jesus, who is always our peace and help, comes to save us with a plan! He unveils His 'Peace-

Making' Forgiveness Plan in today's gospel!

Jesus' life-saving cross wipes away division, hate and hurt; as St Paul says in Ephesians 2:14 "For **He Himself is our peace**, who has **made the two one** and has **torn down the dividing wall** of hostility." So to be in Jesus' presence means all divisive offense is wiped away. He forgives, so have we? Are we cooperating with His plan of reconciliation? Being in God's presence calls us to let go, forgive and accept charitably his grace (As if God says "Check in your divisions with me at the door, no grudges past this point!") Why? Because grudges and hostilities hold us back from receiving fully God's peace. Maybe we fret over personal losses and suffer insomnia or we have been dulled into disillusion over someone's unjust power play over us? So do we keep obsessing over the past or do we start a plan a recovery? I heard someone say to their friend recently, "You are right! But are you happy? You can keep forcing 'rightness' on the others, all the while still losing peace yourself." So what is his plan for us?

Jesus offers five steps in His Kingdom Peace-Making Plan. The first step is to rise to higher ground, find firm-steady ground yourself for stability and the best perspective. Jesus pointed this out, way earlier in Matthew's gospel when he called his disciples to 'pray for persecutors and to love enemies'. He specifically then gave the first step of being pro-active in peace oneself, quickly approaching anyone we have hurt and seek their peace (ours in the process). In Matthew 5:23-24, Jesus said, "Therefore, if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come offer your gift." **Jesus intends this reconciling work to begin immediately.** Don't let much time pass between the offense and its healing (or *at least the beginning of its healing*). Because even just a second moment's delay opens a hold for the Devil to slip into, as St Paul warned in Ephesians 4:26-27 "do not let the sun set on your anger, and do not leave room for the devil." Jesus then gives steps 2-5, in today's gospel reading Matthew 18:15-17. The second step 2) is to **make contact**. Go to them and attempt talking it through, sharing feelings about the experience without accusations. If this fails, the third step 3) is **to recruit a mutually trusted friend**, who may listen with more balance or draw attention to what remains unsaid. Involving other people who are mutually trusted is not for marshalling troops (for or against the other). No, it prevents further relationship decline by opening other perspectives or novel remedies for healing. The fourth step 4) is **seeking greater prayer and intercession by 'taking it to the church'**. This step is not an airing out of scandalous details & feeding the gossip machine, but it is a matter of asking prayer from other good-hearted souls related to both parties, asking the Holy Spirit to find a way through the breakdown. And then the fifth step 5) is **'treat them as a gentile or tax collector'**. Now some interpret this step as some relief as in saying, 'Finally, I can now write them off-good riddance!' Or worse yet, some people mistakenly understand 'treating them as a gentile' in a passively aggressive was as saying, "I tried and now, you, take this!" Such aggression is out of bounds, because God would never justify any personal vengeance of ours. No, **to' treat as a gentile- tax collector' just means that you have to try**

**again from the outside** and **devise a newer more creative approach** to bringing about the reconciliation. Again, why can't we just 'write off' those inconvenient-hurtful folks in our lives? Because we know that this same Jesus who tells us to 'treat them as a gentile-tax collector' is the same one who was said "Those who are well do not need a physician, but the sick do" (Matthew 9:10-12). He said that after being asked why he bothered visiting with 'sinners and tax collectors'. This is the same Jesus who said, "the Son of Man **came to seek and to save the lost**" (Even more, Jesus said in Luke 19:10 that he **specifically came FOR** the sinner/tax collector/gentile!)

Sometimes we throw up justifications to NOT forgive someone else. We might even feel like we are JUSTIFIED in not forgiving. But any lack of forgiveness exposes 'hardness in our hearts'. We know we have this 'weight' on us, if we have ever added the following five excuses to our statement, "I won't forgive because .....

- .....Every time I think of them, I just get burned up!
- .....They won't admit they did anything wrong!
- .....They keep right on doing it, treating others the same hurtful way they treated me!
- .....They actually played the 'victim' thinking my hurt offends them!
- .....They enjoyed it. They are so arrogant, they took delight in putting me down!

Beware of these non-forgiving attitudes because they keep us 'in the hurt' more, while we continue to hand power over us to the offender. The injured has to move to higher ground, and view everything in proper perspective. I think of Jesus rising upon the cross. He even said himself, "When I am lifted up from the earth, **I will draw all to Myself**" (John 12:32). The highest perspective; that is what we seek! With forgiveness 'work' (**and it is WORK**), we always have to keep in mind, what Jesus told his disciples about seemingly discouraging tasks, "For human beings this is impossible, but for God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26). We are not done with forgiveness this week, as we are going to hear part two of Jesus' forgiveness teaching next week. He will tell Peter and us that we must forgive many, many times in following him! I will close with a great quote from the writer Jim Brault, "If you can't both forgive and forget, then just pick one....." Hey wait, I get it, either way, you find peace! Exactly! And Jesus said, "But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because what was dead, has come to life again; what was lost, now has been found" (Luke 15:32)! Peace comes through forgiveness!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

**Sunday:** What lasting thought or concern stayed with me from Mass? What is heavy on my heart right now? What will be different about this coming week because of Mass?

**Monday:** Do I hold any grudges? Select one to work on this week. Start by praying about it.

**Tuesday:** How can I extend peace to someone who has hurt or offended me in the past?

**Wednesday:** Might I need to jump-start peace, by asking 'forgiveness' from someone I have 'offended, even though I may not have meant to cause any harm or hurt?

**Thursday:** Can I offer my services to help bridge a divide between others I know? How can I be a peacemaker and mediator for them?

**Friday:** Perform an act of sacrifice for the good of someone you have hurt in the past.

**Saturday:** How can I offer a return of thanks to god at Mass this weekend for the many blessings God has given me over the years?


**Al-Anon Meeting:** Mondays 7:00 pm St Romuald Parish Hall. Come find support and understanding to recover a sense of serenity in your life.

## PRAYER AND SPIRITUALITY

### **A Word from Pope Francis:**

"Some people believe that all of life's happiness lay only in youth and in the past, and that living is just a slow decay and long loss. Still others hold that the only joy we receive here is episodic and passionate. But as Christians, we don't believe this. We believe instead that on man's horizon there is a sun that illuminates forever. We can have that joy all through our life. There is hope now, and more hope to come! We believe that even more beautiful days are still to come. We are Easter People: people more of spring than autumn. Don't forget this good question to ask ourselves: "Am I a man, woman or child of the Spring or of the Fall? The Spring, which waits for flowers, fruit, the sun, which is Jesus; or the autumn, which is always looking down, embittered, and closing down or giving up." (Homily 8-23-2017)

**Family Movie Night:** "Silence" tells the stunning story of 17th century Christian missionaries who travel to Japan in search of their missing mentor, at a time when Christianity was outlawed. If you want to test your discipleship, don't talk behind anyone's back, but deal with insults and abuses face to face in a spirit of love and reconciliation.

**Hard prayers**

Perhaps we better honor Mary's Most Holy Name if we pray and work for peace instead.

**MEMORIAL OF JOHN CHRYSOSTOM, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH**

**Shed some light on the world**

Saint John Chrysostom, the archbishop of Constantinople from 398 to his death in 407, often reminded his subjects to offer prayers universally—that is, to pray for everybody in the whole world. "For [Jesus Christ] did not say 'thy will be done in me or in us,' but 'on earth,' the whole earth," he wrote. Because of the influence of this great Doctor of the church, the prayers of the faithful after the Creed at Mass are called "general intercessions." We pray for friends and enemies, the poor and the rich, the weak and the powerful, the victims of violence and those who inflict it. Our prayers are lights that shine in the darkness.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Colossians 3:1-11; Luke 6:20-26 (439).* "At once Jesus spoke to them, 'Take courage, it is I; do not

be afraid.'"

**Thursday, Sep 14, 2017**

**FEAST OF THE EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS  
Christ before us**

Russian author Alexander Solzhenitsyn, exiled for years in a Soviet gulag, had finally reached the limits of his endurance. Bitter cold and brutal treatment had taken their toll. He put down his shovel and sat down, resigning himself to a swift, violent death at the hands of the guards. A gaunt, old prisoner scurried over and knelt before him. He said nothing but traced the sign of the cross in the dirt. As Solzhenitsyn stared at this symbol, a ray of light pierced his soul. He did not have to face the evil of the gulag alone. Christ had gone before him. Today is the feast of the True Cross, the one that makes sense of our sufferings and gives us the strength to endure whatever life hands us.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Numbers 21:4b-9; Philippians 2:6-11; John 3:13-17 (638).* "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up."

**Friday, Sep 15, 2017**

**MEMORIAL OF OUR LADY OF SORROWS**

**Good grief**

There isn't a lot of support for personal grief. While we have days for national mourning, families in mourning are expected to pull themselves together and return to their routines in fairly short order. The placement of Our Lady of Sorrows on the liturgical calendar right after the day honoring the Holy Cross is a reminder that sorrow doesn't go away once the memorial rituals are observed. It may be good that our loved one is no longer suffering, but that doesn't lessen our sadness. Make room for grief, both yours and that of others.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Timothy 1:1-2, 12-14 (441); John 19:25-27 or Luke 2:33-35 (639).* "Standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister . . . and Mary Magdalene."

**Saturday, Sep 16, 2017**

**MEMORIAL OF CYPRIAN, BISHOP, MARTYR**

**Build on a loving foundation**

The third-century life of Saint Cyprian, bishop of Carthage, might have given rise to the comedy tag line: "It's always something," but his troubles and those of the church were anything but funny. If it wasn't a heresy, it was bitter controversy over whether someone who had renounced the faith might be reconciled with the church; or it was exile, or the plague, or schism. Cyprian's response was always generosity. During a terrible plague, for example, he himself cared for the sick and buried the dead—Christians and non-Christians alike—exemplifying his own words: "Love is the foundation of all the virtues." How can love calm the troubles of your own life today?

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Timothy 1:15-17; Luke 6:43-49 (442).* "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

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
