Why do we have Advent?

Advent as we know it today developed many centuries after Jesus' life on earth. Because of the number of persons being baptized in the early Church, a practice developed of having another time for baptism in addition to the Easter Vigil. Christmas was chosen as another baptismal season. Since Lent served as a time of preparation for the baptisms at the Easter Vigil, the weeks leading up to Christmas became a time of penance and preparation.

Combined with this penitential practice, of course, was the preparation for Christmas. The Sunday and weekday Scriptures during Advent recall the centuries of longing for the coming of the Messiah, the conception of John the Baptist, and the family history of Mary and Joseph. Today the writings of the prophet Isaiah are featured during Advent because they so eloquently speak of Israel's longing for salvation.

Among the special signs and symbols that the Church uses to recall and enter into these central parts of our Christian heritage are the Advent wreath, vespers, reconciliation services, the O Antiphons, Scripture readings, the Jesse tree, the giving tree, the Christmas tree, the crèche, gift-giving, and of course, Midnight Mass. Hopefully, these symbols of the season will remind you of your own birth in baptism and your own commitment to living a life filled with peace and love.

Happy Advent! We begin our four week countdown to Christmas today, watching and waiting for the Lord's Coming! As a historical event, over two thousand years ago, Jesus the Messiah was born in Bethlehem. Yet as an end-time event (aka. 'eschatological'- meaning 'last-or end or utmost') we await the promised 'return' again of Jesus. Many people think right away of Jesus' ascension as recorded in Luke and Acts where Jesus says in response to a question about the 'restored kingdom of God's People' in Acts 1:7-8 "" **It is**

not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority." And after rising up out of sight, two men in white (angels?) say "why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return in the same way as you have seen him going into heaven." (Acts 1:11). So we await that Second Coming, and use Jesus' historical birth as a model of how to wait in the time leading up to His Return. So, a first question is, how long was the waiting until Jesus came the first time? It was quite a while. In fact by all accounts, the waiting began almost from the very beginning of time-maybe just a day or hour after Adam and Eve's creation. It was their Sin and Fall that called for humanity's **need of a Savior**. So we may be in this waiting stage for a while. A second question is, how do we wait, and what do we do in the mean time? We are following good company if we do what the holy men and women of the Old Testament did while waiting for a Savior. We should keep the commands of God, practice virtue, stay faithful to prayer, offer divine worship and read every day the given words of the Lord, including all of the prophets' messages of conversion and repentance. These works will lead us to recognize the Savior when he arrives! So here we are in Advent, doing just that!

To help us, we use an Advent wreath to countdown the days to Christmas. Some people see the four candles as representing four epochs or thousand-year periods from creation until Jesus' coming. Of course, astrologic and geologic signs from the universe and earth indicate that God's creation goes further back in time than that, but we can draw great symbolic meaning in viewing the long waiting period from Adam's Fall to Jesus' arriving to redeem us, in **four stages**. I think of Jesus as Lord of all Space, and King of all Time, so it makes sense to see Jesus' coming as the **fulfillment of fours**: just as we mark four seasons of time and four directions of space! So on our circular wreath we position four candles to reveal the gradual increasing of light that culminates in the coming of Savior! I also like, that we use **evergreens** on the wreath to indicate 'ever-living' beyond a season and greens that rise from the ground (imagine the green of pine trees leading your eye skyward and to take the place of the green of flat fields!). In our waiting period, we have great messianic readings to study. We read such prophets as Isaiah, Jeremiah, Zephaniah and Micah! We focus on living more faithfully, which includes repentance and making life-changes if needed. We often think mostly of John the Baptist as our Advent Prophet, since he was the last one. He did fulfil the role as the 'last call' and the immediate precursor to Jesus' coming ('voice in wilderness crying out 'Prepare'-Isaiah 40:3). However, I like to dedicate time in Advent to read again some of the other OT prophets in depth. So much lyric poetry and imaginative language describing God and our relationship to Him comes from the Old Testament Prophets (potter-clay, shepherd-flock, gardener-vineyard, holy mountains, blooming deserts, etc. and lions and lambs living together). I encourage everyone to dip into the longer works

of Isaiah or Jeremiah, or if time is an issue, try reading the shorter books of Amos or Micah. Praying with the Prophets is an excellent Advent activity. Take a moment, sit down with a prophet, read and pray together. Imagine you are waiting at the bus-stop, or better yet, the airport watching for your flight to arrive!

Mark 13:35 "Watch, therefore; you do not know when the lord of the house is coming"

We have all heard this before: "*For quality assurance your phone call may be monitored or recorded.*" I understand the original idea behind 'monitoring' calls, was to provide good service through the accountability to supervisors evaluating them. Yet, I hear that line of Jesus about watching and keeping alert to suggest the same idea to us as disciples. In our practice of faith, we need to stay committed to good work and be ever-watchful for the Master's return. For the best following of Jesus, assume our life of service is being recorded for the **assurance of fidelity**. In fact, it may be broadcast one day over all God's creation (it will at our own day of judgement). The Book of Revelation 20:12, actually says, "*I saw the dead, the great and the lowly, standing before the throne, and scrolls were opened. Then another scroll was opened, the book of life. The dead were judged according to their deeds, by what was written in the scrolls.*" As workers in God's Kingdom, it sounds like our *work is being recorded*, whether we think the master is on the site or away. We could say, "**For salvation assurance**, our actions are being recorded and monitored." This is a good check on our faithfulness. We should spend our time waiting for the Master's return, knowing that everything is being registered. We should live and work the same, thinking the Master is right over our shoulder, or just gone away on a short break. Our gospel today calls us to simply keep faithful to our God-given duties and responsibilities, whether we feel we are being supervised or not. As good work, I do it not because I am being watched, but because it is good in itself, and it is what I am supposed to do. I heard someone say once that the measure of a person's faithfulness and goodness is **what they do when no one is watching**. For example, it is easy to do the right thing when the whole world is watching, but true goodness shines most in the shadows when no one is watching. As good servants to Jesus we serve best when we simply keep focused on the task in front of us. While we wait, we work! Jesus summarizes it best in his one word in Mark 13:37 "**Watch!**"

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: Did God speak to my heart today about any issue or problem I have been facing? Did I ask God for direction in any situation I am facing?

Monday: Am I patient? How do I handle 'waiting'? Pray about it and try to practice.

Tuesday: Am I keeping my faith, and staying focused on God today, just as much as I was Sunday morning? Do I take my faith into my week's activities?

Wednesday: Are we ready for Christ's return? What if it was today? What about NOW?

Thursday: How can I help others ready themselves for Christ's coming? Is there anything can say or do to help someone else focus upon God more in his/her life?

Friday: Perform an act of sacrifice for the good of someone you have hurt in the past.

Saturday: What special blessings, will I be thanking God for at mass this weekend?

A Word from Pope Francis:

Make a welcoming and friendly space for all the least of these of our time to come into your life: the marginalized, men and women who live in our streets and parks; the thousands of unemployed, as well as the many sick people who do not have access to adequate care; many abandoned elders; mistreated women; immigrants seeking a respectable life and all those who live on 'margins' deprived of dignity. Learn to be, as St. Francis said, "sick with the sick, afflicted with the afflicted." The initials for Franciscans are OFM, Order of Friars Minor, so keep alive the 'minor' (little one) part. We are 'minority', so always humble yourselves" (Angelus 11-23-17).

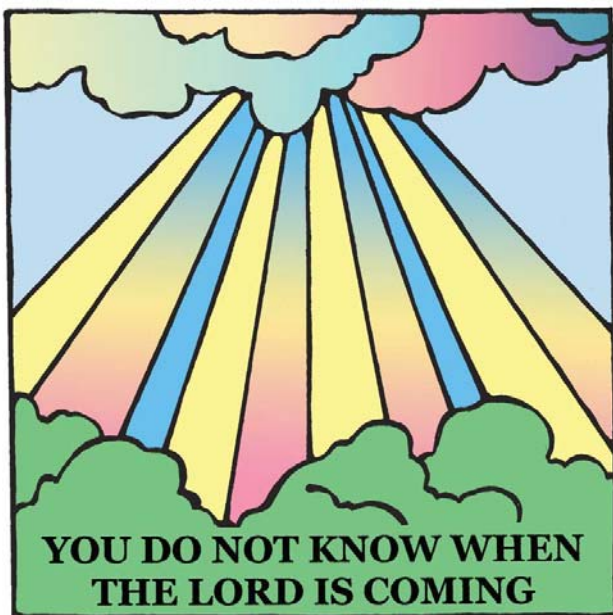

**FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT
Mindfulness 101**

Be aware of your surroundings. Look where you're going. Think before you speak. Remember to breathe. Be here now. Pithy reminders to be mindful have been sprinkled into the popular diet for so long, they tend to join the background noise

we train ourselves to ignore. Too bad: Mindfulness isn't just for monks and yoga fans. Jesus invites us to live in watchful awareness of our times, ready to respond in any given situation. Practice being present to every person and each hour today. Where is the Spirit drawing you this Advent season?

MEMORIAL OF JUAN DIEGO CUAUHTLATOATZIN

More than meets the eye

There are many accounts of the apparitions of the Virgin of Guadalupe in 1531 to Saint Juan Diego, an indigenous Mexican who had converted to Catholicism after the Spanish conquest. There are also many questions about the historical accuracy of those accounts. But great stories also serve a purpose beyond historical literalism—they speak to our hearts of greater truths that are sometimes best captured in epics. A great mythic story is not necessarily false—it can be true at a deeper, more symbolic, and powerful level than facts alone can approach. Dip into some deeper truth by searching online for good accounts of the Guadalupe story.
