Especially before Christmas, I appreciate times of silence at Mass but seldom find them. Priests ask the congregation to open their missalettes after Communion to recite the daily antiphon, which seems more trouble to locate and say than to simply remain silent. Please advise.

Before Mass, it's commendable that silence be observed in the church, sacristy, vesting room, and adjacent areas so that all may "carry out the sacred celebration in a devout and fitting manner" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 45).

During Mass, "Let us pray" is an invitation to observe a moment of silence for the congregation to "place themselves in God's presence and make their personal petitions" (Introduction to the Order of Mass, 35). Communal silence is also observed within the penitential act for people to recollect themselves, at the end of a reading or the homily for all to meditate briefly on what they've heard, then after Communion to praise and pray to God in their hearts (GIRM 45). In other words, there's a silence that reflects shame before God for our sins, a silence that reflects our need to ponder his word, and a deep silence before God that reflects awe and incapacity for words after receiving the Body of Christ!

If there's no singing after Communion, the antiphon "may be recited either by the faithful, or by some of them, or by a reader; otherwise, it is recited by the priest himself after he has received Communion and before he distributes Communion to the faithful" (GIRM 87). Without liturgical silence, "the celebration can become perfunctory in its haste or burdensome in its unrelieved sound and song" (Introduction 48). Fr. Byron Miller, CSsR

John the Baptist is the 1) **one** crying out in the 2) **desert**! That makes John sound 'doubly lonely'. Both his location and his message contribute to his solitude! This aloneness is seen in Jesus even more so, when we hear him reprimand his apostles in the Garden of Gethsemane in Matthew 26:40 "Was no one able to keep watch *with Me* for one hour?" and in Mark 14:27 when he mentions that they will all *abandon him* saying, "it is written: 'I will strike

the shepherd, and the sheep will be dispersed." So John shares with Jesus that 'lonely task' of being prophetic. **His 1) message and 2) location are 'prophetic'**. First, John realizes that his message is not one that people are jumping up and down to celebrate. As a prophet, John was calling down everyone to admit their sins and errors. We know human nature is instinctually defensive, ego-protective and self-justifying. So, reminding people of their error and sin sounds like a recipe for rejection. It almost seems at times the prophet's job is to be rejected, and even be hated, because they point out the 'hard to hear' truths. For example, who wants to listen to "You are wrong! Get your life right!" Or who willingly accepts the dressing down of hearing "Your actions are sinful, convert from them and offer penance"? John's message of 'Repent, the Kingdom is near' amounts to announcing that Judgement Time is eminent and **we all stand judged 'Guilty'**! But if we think about it, we all know that each of us has plenty in our lives and past to be sorry about and for which to offer amends. Romans 3:23 reads, "for **all** have sinned and **fall short** of the glory of God". And Psalm 53:3 says "**There is no one who does good**, not even one." And Jesus himself says in Mark 10:18 "No one is good but God alone." So, John's message is for **all of us to hear and admit**. No matter whether our error and shortcomings are public sins or private sins, whether our guilt is over 'what we have done wrong, or good that we have failed to do' or whether our struggle is over sins of flesh or sins of the heart, John invites us to 1) examine ourselves honestly, 2) to recommit to good and 3) begin again following Jesus!

Secondly, John is also prophetic in his living: his location, his diet and his clothing. He is staying in the desert, he feeds on locusts and wild honey and he wears simple camel skins and a leather belt. He has chosen the desert as the location of his ministry and that says a lot. Deserts are quiet places, they have few distractions, and there are very few people out there. Also, a person only goes to the desert with the 'essentials'. We go there with the simplest of goods, packing light, to not be weighed down with a lot of baggage. All these desert-details introduce good opportunities for examining closely one's life. With quiet space and no distractions we can prioritize our values and reflect upon what is most important in life. John's diet and clothing also says a lot about him 'living off the land', being content with what the surrounding environment provides. He is embodying Jesus' later mission commands about keeping with us only what is necessary for ministry. Luke 9:3 even says "**Take nothing** for the journey". Why nothing? Because God will provide, God will give all that is needed, **WHEN** it is needed! This is a prophetic witness to 'trusting' God and showing faith in God's providence!

A note for curiosity's sake is that **John's clothing was a signal to everyone** familiar with the Old Testament prophetic tradition that John was dressing just like the great prophet Elijah. For example, **Elijah's ID** was his uniform as

we hear in 2 Kings 1:7-8 "The king asked, "What was the man like who met you and said these things to you?" They replied, "**He wore a hairy garment with a leather belt around his waist.**" Then the King said, "**That is Elijah the Tishbite!**"

For John to look like Elijah is so important because the OT expectation was that before the Saving Messiah came to earth, Elijah was to show up as preparation. The book of Malachi 3:23 (aka 4:5) says that "**I am sending to you, Elijah the prophet, Before the day of the LORD come**" Jesus Himself confirmed this expectation when he said in Matthew 11:14 "if you are willing to accept it, John is Elijah, the one who is to come." (*Another neat similarity between John and Elijah is that just as John trusted God to provide the food of locusts & honey in the desert, so similarly, Elijah trusted God to feed him in the wilderness with whatever was available, and God sent 'ravens to bring him food'-1 Kings 17:4*). The fact that everyone saw John the Baptist as 'Elijah' himself come back or as someone just like Elijah, says that people were looking more for the follow-up appearance of the long-awaited Messiah. And that is what we are doing today: waiting for the Second Coming of Jesus to restore all things in Himself according to the Father's Will. The Messiah will reconcile all things; reconstituting everything, just like back in the Garden of Eden-harmony among all things as our Creator designed! Advent reminds us to actively wait and watch for that coming day. We need to be ready ourselves. Also, like John or Elijah we need to help others ready themselves by showing them our preparedness reflected in our way of living. We know our world is a mess and desperately in need of saving, so we help the world by inviting it along too. May our life-changes and acts of penance inspire others to ready themselves to welcome Jesus' coming again! St Paul says it this way in Romans 12:19 & 22, "**For all creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God.....**We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains [for its change] even until now". So we wait and prepare! A good question to pray over is to ask ourselves, "What changes have I made so far in preparation and what else can I do to help others be ready?"

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: What message stayed with me after Mass today form the prayers or readings?

Monday: How is my Advent going? In what ways, am I preparing to celebrate Jesus' birth anew this Christmas? What am I doing different this year?

Tuesday: Am I a patient person? Have I been practicing the virtue of patience with others as we all wait for Christmas?

Wednesday: What lessons does John the Baptist's way of life (lodging, diet and clothing) say to me? Does it call me to simplify my life?

Thursday: Take a moment in your daily prayer and quiet to read a book or chapter from an Old Testament prophet such as Isaiah, Jeremiah or Amos.

Friday: Perform an act of sacrifice for the good of someone you have hurt in the past.

Saturday: What special blessings, will I be thanking God for at mass this weekend?

A Word from Pope Francis:

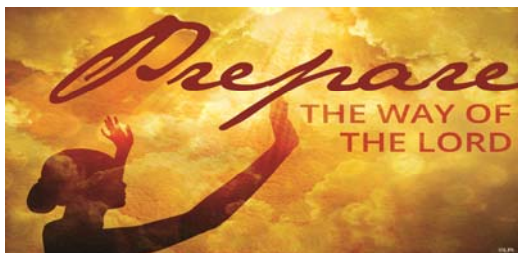
"At the end of our life we will be judged on love, that is, on our concrete commitment to love and serve Jesus in the least of our brothers and the needy. Yet before Jesus comes at the end of time to judge all the nations, but he (also) comes to us every day, in so many ways, and asks us to welcome him. To be welcomed into His Kingdom, we need to have received Him through acts of care toward our brothers and sisters, because Jesus says "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you dressed me, sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to see me." This word never ceases to hit us, because it reveals to what extent God's love comes to us: to the point of being identified with us, but not when we are well, healthy and happy, no, but when we are in need. The decisive criterion of His judgment is concrete love for neighbor in their distress." (Homily 11-26-17).

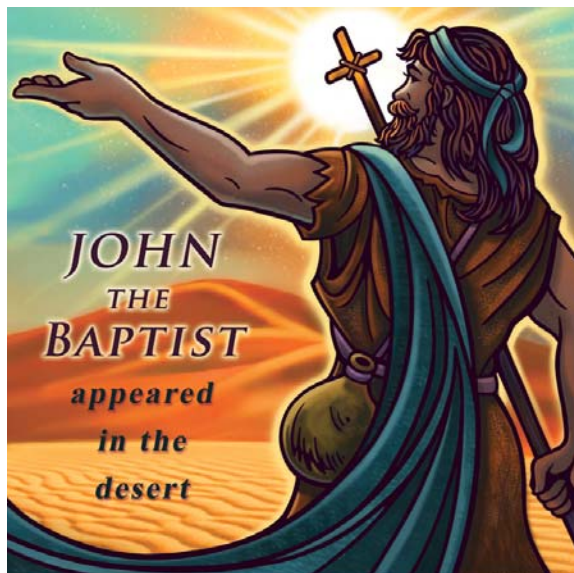

Sunday, Dec 10, 2017 SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT Might makes right?

Strength is good; weakness is bad. These are primary lessons of the playground and if we don't embrace them, we may live to suffer their effects. Yet even a fighter like Saint Paul would come to appreciate the opposite lesson: that power reaches perfection only in weakness. John the Baptist would frame it another way: "Jesus must increase, and I must decrease." It turns out that might rarely makes right, and more often seeks as much wrong as it can get away with. Jesus wields divine might *for* right. When you have the upper hand, consider laying it down.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11; 2 Peter 3:8-14; Mark 1:1-8 (5). "And this is what John proclaimed: 'One mightier than I is coming after me.'"*

Monday, Dec 11, 2017 MEMORIAL OF DAMASUS I, POPE Good bookkeeping helps

The pontificate of Damasus (366-384) occurred during a stormy time in the early church, with controversies and divisions on all sides. Perhaps Damasus' greatest contribution was his insight that a standardized version of the Bible was desperately needed to clear the air. In 382 he commissioned a highly respected scholar named Jerome to revise the Bible into a more accurate and updated Latin version, working directly from the original Greek and Hebrew. Saint Jerome's monumental effort came to be known as the *Vulgate*, meaning "translated into a native language." Even though Latin long ago stopped being a language of everyday use, the Vulgate still holds an honored position in the church. Be grateful for the Good Book and open it up today.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 35:1-10; Luke 5:17-26 (181). "Which is easier, to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise and walk?'"*

Tuesday, Dec 12, 2017 FEAST OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE Viva Guadalupe!

Mexican Catholics have long revered the Virgin of Guadalupe as a symbol of God's compassionate presence among the people. She is also an important symbol of Mexican nationalism. In 1810, when Father Miguel Hidalgo initiated the movement that led to Mexican independence, he and his followers carried a banner of Guadalupe and shouted, "Death to bad government, long live the Virgin of Guadalupe!" Guadalupe was proclaimed "Patroness of the Americas"—including the United States—by Pope Pius XII in 1946. She continues to serve as an apt symbol of loving care for all God's people. Perhaps you can attend a celebration of her feast day today, or find your own personal way to commemorate the feast.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Zechariah 2:14-17 or Revelation 11:19a; 12:1-6a, 10ab; Luke 1:26-38 or Luke 1:39-47 (690A). "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!"*

Wednesday, Dec 13, 2017 MEMORIAL OF LUCY, VIRGIN, MARTYR Shed some light on the season

Saint Lucy is one of those early saints about whom we know little, though we have some wonderful legendary stories about her that have to do with her name, which means "light." We

remember her because she lived—and died—in a time when Christians, to remain faithful, regularly paid the price of their lives. Today we also cross over the midpoint of the Advent season, when we prepare for the coming of the One who is the way, the truth, and the light. Celebrate this saint of light and clear sight by keeping your inner eye open for the Light of the World.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 40:25-31; Matthew 11:28-30 (183). "Lift up your eyes on high and see."*

Thursday, Dec 14, 2017 MEMORIAL OF JOHN OF THE CROSS, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

A closer walk with thee

Saint John of the Cross, a Spanish mystic, was born in 1542. He wrote *The Dark Night of the Soul*, which explores the doubt and spiritual dryness all serious Christians experience on their spiritual journey. Though difficult and painful, the dark night of the soul is an invitation to a deeper closeness with God through greater trust and abandonment to God's will. Saint John wrote, "Oh night that guided me, Oh night more lovely than the dawn." During the holiday season it's not unusual for people to experience doubt and emptiness. Pray to Saint John of the Cross to shore up your faith and give you courage on your way toward God.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 41:13-20; Matthew 11:11-15 (184). "Among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist."*

Friday, Dec 15, 2017 ADVENT WEEKDAY Stay true to the spirit

Some folks never have a good word for anybody. This was true in the time of Jesus, when people criticized John the Baptist for fasting, and then spoke badly of Jesus for feasting! Then when Jesus performed healing miracles, some thought he acted by the power of the devil. When he refused a miraculous rescue to save himself from the cross, they said God had abandoned him. Don't listen to the critics—follow the Spirit's prompting.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 48:17-19; Matthew 11:16-19 (185). "John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, 'He has a demon.'"*

Saturday, Dec 16, 2017 ADVENT WEEKDAY John points the way

John the Baptist is a prominent personality in Advent. His style is that of the Old Testament prophets, but he points to the New Testament reality of Jesus. He didn't become a follower of Jesus, even though he was the forerunner of the "one who is to come." John's message is delivered in the "fire and brimstone" language of career prophets like Amos or Jeremiah. But his greatest resemblance is to Elijah, whose return was anticipated before the arrival of the messiah. Like John, we, too, "prepare the way" for Jesus to come into the world.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Sirach 48:1-4, 9-11; Matthew 17:9a, 10-13 (186). "Elijah has already come, and they did not recognize him."*

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
